

## THIS IS WHO WE ARE: Gabriel Lampert

*The Openhouse Monthly Interview*

After many years teaching mathematics at New Mexico State University, Gabriel came to San Francisco to enjoy his retirement. San Francisco had been his favorite place for vacations and two and a half years ago, he made the move. Now, settled in the Outer Richmond district, he has created a community for himself that includes the Openhouse men's group, his local synagogue in the Sunset and Congregation Sha'ar Zahav on Dolores Street.

"I decided to really make connections as soon as I could," he said.

Although currently single, Gabriel has what he calls a "domesticated partner," his dog, Harley (13). "I'm quite certain that in a previous life, Harley was a greeter on a cruise ship. I've met so many interesting people through him."

Born in Philadelphia 68 years ago, Gabriel graduated from the University of Pennsylvania after receiving a scholarship and went on to the University of Chicago. "But I had got asthma early as a child and Chicago's air pollution made me very sick," he said. "I was advised to move to New Mexico for my health."

Living first in Las Cruces and then moving to Tucson, AZ, Gabriel did not come out to his parents until a hate crime killed one of his best friends. "My friend Mani had gone to Phoenix for a job and was killed outside a gay bar because someone wanted to kill a gay person. His parents had gotten the double whammy of coping with his murder and the fact that he was gay, so I had to come out to my parents. They didn't reject me. My father couldn't have cared less but my mother wanted grandchildren. She didn't see it as sin, but she was never able to quite deal with it."

After his friend's death, Gabriel moved back to Las Cruces and came out to his faculty fellows at NMSU. "I began to get politically involved. This was my way of grief. If they passed laws against discrimination then people wouldn't think that gays were a moving free-fire zone. So I worked my ass off to get laws passed. It took years; it was frustrating for everyone who did it. I insisted that the synagogue back any gay legislation up in Santa Fe, and at least in that I was always successful. But there were always more gay-bashings, especially at New Mexico State [University]. I became the go-to guy for gay students

who had been harassed, and advocated with the administration, or the housing authority, on their behalf. Often we got what we asked for. Nevertheless, the victim almost always at some point just dropped out of school. That hurt a lot; it felt like a hurdle I just couldn't jump." Gabriel continued: "Both my department and my synagogue supported me so it was much easier for me to be gay than for a lot of other people. There really was not much structured support; Las Cruces is a relatively small community. To be 'gay' was not too difficult, but to be sexually active was extremely difficult. At one point, we had a chief of police who was pro-gay and wanted to have training sessions with the cadets so that they could talk one-on-one with a

gay person. I got some nasty feedback from people in the gay community on that: They didn't want to be singled out or talk to cops.

Various groups started, went on for a while, then came in-fighting and (they) usually disappeared. In general, a group would go on as long as the founding member was willing to put in the time to keep it going and when they couldn't do it anymore, it would collapse. I think that's very common in all social movements, especially in small communities. It's not shocking but it is very difficult and it wears you out. I really know about being burnt out."

Gabriel's specialty in Math at NMSU was statistics. "People don't really see the extent that we see the world statistically. Take the drive/walk example: you are making a probabilistic decision as in: I think I can make it across the street – I'm not going to get hit. Whether you know it or not, you are making a probabilistic decision. So often people make absolute comments about the world, but they're almost always wrong, whereas statistically you can say something 'appears to be true,' which is closer to reality. Almost all of the time, we are making decisions on less than total information. That's what statistics are about. My father used to say, 'figures don't lie but liars figure'."

During his time at NMSU, Gabriel received a degree in creative writing. "I decided that there wasn't enough gay fiction so I started taking classes and I published almost a dozen stories and essays." More recently he has created and developed his blog [inaformertime.wordpress.com](http://inaformertime.wordpress.com). He says his blog works as a vehicle to publish his literary work in essays, poetry and fiction.

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Throughout his life, Gabriel has been sustained by his Jewish spirituality. "I'm very involved with the Jewish community here. If there's a Jewish community in town that isn't gay friendly, I haven't found it." He attends Congregation Sha'ar Zahav, the progressive synagogue known for its LGBT membership, and a synagogue in the outer Sunset. "I have always enjoyed chanting and have studied it extensively; it's my particular spirituality. I also do calligraphy and have tutored a young girl for her Bat Mitzvah and someone who is converting to Judaism." It is a rich and fulfilling life although Gabriel is openly looking for a partner to share it with.

From his blog, Gabriel comments:

*Having retired and moved to San Francisco, I feel like the land, slowly decompressing after the glaciers' retreat. I have cried now for those lives lost or mangled, and will probably continue to do so for a while. At my first real Pride parade, I refused the offer of a young woman who wanted me to carry a political sign – even though I agreed with its purpose. "I've been doing political activism for 40 years," I said, "and today is my off day." She was very gracious. There are plenty of others to do this work, and thank God for that. It doesn't have to be me.*

Director Christopher Guest returns with another "mockumentary" that casts a satirical gaze on the world of championship dog shows. This hilarious comedy won dozens of awards and was nominated for the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation Award for Outstanding Film. If you've never seen this film, you are in for a real treat.

The film focuses on the surreal interactions among the various dog owners and handlers as they travel to the big show and compete. Salesman Gerry Fleck (Eugene Levy) and his wife Cookie (Catherine O'Hara) have entered their Norwich terrier "Winky" in competition. Wealthy and neurotic Meg Swan (Parker Posey) and her husband Hamilton (Michael Hitchcock) are on hand with "Beatrice," who they fear may have been traumatized by watching them have sex. Scott Donlan (John Michael Higgins) and his partner Stefan Vanderhoof (Michael McKean) have brought their beloved Shih Tzu, "Miss Agnes." Director Christopher Guest portrays the soft-spoken ventriloquist Harlan Pepper, who hails from Pine Nut, North Carolina and has decided to stack his bloodhound "Hubert" up against the competition.
